Dear Shark Families,

It's hard to believe that we are in the second trimester of school! Throughout the first trimester students were busy reading, writing, increasing math fluency and showing great character! We have also set School Improvement Goals this year that encourage all students and staff to continue to grow:

Goal 1: The percentage of students in 4th and 5th grade who scored in the "Meets" or "Exceeds" category on the 2018-2019 IAR ELA Assessment will increase by 5% on the 2019-

2020 assessment (42% to 47%).

Goal 2: By the 2019-2020 administration of the 5Essentials, Southbury Elementary School will increase the raw score by 15 points in “Quality Professional Development” in the Collaborative Teachers category of the 5Essentials Survey.

In order to achieve these goals, we hope to work closely with all our students, staff, and families to ensure our children are receiving the best education to success in all areas!

HSO Co-Presidents



Kindergarten

ELA: The students have learned how characters can change in a story and how a character reacts to events in a story. We have learned characters can show their emotions on their face and the author can use words to describe the character's feelings. We have focused on retelling stories using "first, next and last."

Writing: Wow! The students have made so much progress on segmenting sounds in their writing. We have reviewed the vowel sounds (a, e, i, o and u) because the medial sound is challenging with writing. When writing at home please encourage your child to leave spaces in between each word and a punctuation mark at the end of the sentence.

Math: We have explored teen numbers 11-19 (also known as "ten and some more" numbers). We have decomposed numbers into a group of ten and ones. For example, 18 is one set of 10 and 8 ones. Students will be assessed on writing numbers 0-20 next month. We have focused on writing numbers 11-19 and making sure we write the number "1" first.

Social Studies:

At the end of November, we will be learning about Pilgrims and Native Americans. We will immerse students in informational and fiction texts about the first Thanksgiving.

1st Grade

First Grade had a very busy November! We had Veteran's Day, Donuts with Dad, American Education Week, writing letters to Santa or Frosty and disguising turkeys. Thank you to all the parents who came out to speak with our classes during American Education Week. Some of the topics we covered were:

ELA

- Identifying story elements
- Narrative Writing process
- Practice reading high frequency words and/or fluency passages

Math

- Number talks continue all year long
- Addition strategies: counting on, doubles, doubles +1 and -1, making ten to add

Science

- Our new unit is Light and Sound
- Identify how to make light areas darker

Social Studies

- Weather and seasons
- City, Town and Suburb

First grade will be continuing our tradition of caroling at Bickford on December 18th @4:15pm.

2nd Grade

In September we started "Agriculture in the Classroom" which is sponsored by the Kendall County Co-op. They will visit all second grade classrooms four times throughout the school year. The purpose of the program is to help students understand where their food and clothing come from as well as help the students learn about plant science, which is what we are currently focusing on in Science. We have wrapped up our unit on plants and seeds. Miss Hannah, from the Kendall County Co-Op, came in during the month of November. She taught us all about pumpkins. Did you know that Illinois is one of the top producers of pumpkins in the United States?

We are continuing to move forward in our curriculum areas. During Math, we worked on addition of two- digit and three-digit numbers. Which will lead into subtraction of two-digit and three-digit numbers. In Reading, our focus has been Sequence of Events, beginning, middle and end of a text. In Writing, we have worked on stating opinions along with details/facts that support our opinions. In Social Studies, have learned and researched important historical figures that made a great impact in our history. We have also learned about the Thanksgiving holiday.

Please continue to read with your child on a nightly basis. Also, because the upcoming math content is challenging, there may be additional reinforcement work sent home to assist with these skills. [Prodigy](#), [eSpark](#) and [X-tra Math](#) are also great ways to practice these skills at home. Thank you for your continued support. Looking forward to a great December!

3rd Grade

Greeting from 3rd grade! November is going by so quickly, especially since we have been so focused on learning! We are so excited about the 3rd grade musical called "Let's Eat!" In math, all the classrooms are working hard on multiplying and dividing. We have been using many strategies to help up solve problems. Please continue working on those facts at home, too!

We are finishing up the book, "The Year of Miss Agnes" and have been focusing on character traits including motivations and feelings. The students are using key details to find the central message. In writing, they are using dialogue and temporal words. Most student are finished with their magazine article they wrote on a planet in our solar system. We were very impressed with their ability to research and write this informational essay!

Our new science unit is called "Balancing Forces." We are investigating floating trains. So far we have had some hands-on activities including chain reactions and touching/non-touching forces.

4th Grade

Our fabulous, fourth-grade students certainly have started their 2nd trimester with a plethora of tall tales and figurative language. We have been working through the components of tall tales, the themes and messages they share, as well as how they incorporated figurative language to paint pictures in our minds. By crafting their tall tale, these young authors will be able to apply their creative juices to some fun narratives.

Moving along in math has meant diving into division. By understanding place-value, we can work on partial-quotient division, and potentially traditional. Please keep working on math facts any chance you get with your child, we have witnessed wonders on how impactful this support has been in the classroom. Thank you!

Once we concluded our study of waves and the transference of energy Science unit, we dove into the Native Americans unit of Social Studies. We will learn how the environment of each region impacted the various group's way of life and the unique characteristics of the group's identity. Finally, we were all very impressed with the hard work your students put into making their student-led conferences a huge success. Thank you for all your support and continued collaborative relationships for their growth as scholars!

5th Grade

5th grade is proud of what we have accomplished so far this year. In reading, we focused on point of view and determining the mood and tone of the text. In writing, we focused on informational writing as we wrote about different environments and exciting topics.

In science, we finished our Ecosystems Unit where students enjoyed taking on the role of ecologists as we learned about the parts of an ecosystem and their important roles. We have been working hard using scientific language when we speak and write about science.

In social studies we learned about the causes of the Civil War as well as the different battles fought during the war. Our Civil War day field trip was an exciting day filled will lots of learning and fun memories!

Finally, in math, we finished up our unit on multiplication and division and have moved on to decimals. It was wonderful talking to all parents who attended conferences. The 5th-grade team greatly appreciates the dedication to all our students' education! We are excited to see what the second trimester brings!

Speech and Language

Why Do I need to practice my speech at home is a question we often hear from students. How long will my child require speech therapy is a question we often hear from parents. While every child develops differently, consistent practice is key. Here is an explanation provided by a fellow speech/language pathologist at superpowerspeech.com.

Learning to speak requires the use of many important parts of your body including your brain, nerves, and muscles. It took you a long time to learn how to talk and it may take a while to learn how to correctly say your sounds. Only YOU can help this process go faster and smoother.

Imagine that you are training for a sport. You have a coach and you practice one or more times per week. Your coach wants you to improve and get better, but they cannot follow you around all day correcting your walking, posture, and strength. Only you can do that. That is your job as an athlete! The more your practice, the better you will become! Champion athletes practice for hours every single day.

Like a coach, the speech/language pathologist's job is to teach you how to make your sounds correctly. However, only you can practice these sounds every time you speak. Each time you correctly practice your new skill, you are teaching your brain and muscles how to make this

sound! Soon it will become as natural as walking! The speech/language pathologist wants you to become the champion athlete of your sound. That means that you must practice every single day!

What will happen if you don't practice? If you don't practice it will take your brain and mouth muscles much longer to learn how to use your correct sounds. Learning a new speech skill (just like an athletic skill) takes time, energy, patience, and PRACTICE.

You can do it! Train like a champ and get those sounds up to champion standards!

Or, maybe pull out an old childhood classic and snuggle up under a cozy blanket to read with a loved one!

News from Nurse Sara

Hello Southbury parents, can you believe we have one more month to end the year? Please read through these reminders as they may pertain to your child.

Please submit **Annual Health History Forms** via the electronic link provided below. This new format has replaced the paper version. This document includes Authorization for Emergency Medical Treatment, and communicates any medical history and medication changes that may occur from one school year to another. These forms need to be completed at the beginning of each school year. If you do not remember submitting an electronic health history, please click the link below to ensure the health office has the most up to date contact and health information available, it is crucial to have this completed.



Kindergarten vision exams were due Oct. 15, 2019, and still needed. Any students who do not have a kindergarten vision exam in their health file were sent home a reminder in October. The goal is to have all kindergarten students with completed examinations per state requirements.

Students new to the state are required to have up to date examinations completed in Illinois. These include physicals and immunizations, dental and vision examinations. The due date is 30 days from when your child is enrolled.

Kindergarten and 2nd grade dental exams will be due May 15, 2020. They can be turned in at any time prior to the due date. They can also be submitted with your student or emailed/faxed to the health office.

A **Medication Authorization Form** is needed for any prescription and over the counter medications including cough drops.
